Surrounded by his adoring family, son of the late Preston and Eleanor (O'Sullivan) Noonan and loving husband to Elizabeth (Mallett), passed away on May 25, 2012 as a result of a heart attack, following an excellent game of golf.

A life-long resident of Prince Edward Island, Richard is predeceased by his parents and brother William (Bill) and will be deeply missed by his sister Adele (Horst) in B.C.; by his adoring children Michael (Melanie) in Summerside, Wendy (Jim King) in Halifax and Joy (Paul Franco) in Ottawa; and also by his four granddaughters Raquel, Katie Joy, Sophie and Molly Jane.

Richard earned his Bachelor of Arts degree from St. Dunstan's University and his degree in Education from Saint Francis Xavier University and was a respected teacher, principal and later assistant school superintendent with the Unit #2 School Board in Prince Edward Island. Richard will also be greatly missed by all of his friends at the Summerside Golf Club where he was a long-time member and by his cousin and dear friend Dr. Jim Noonan of Moncton. 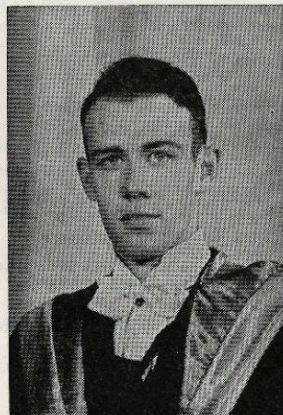
Although the Obit contains no Naval references, Richard had 3 UNTD summers; 1955, '56, '57 all on the East Coast and was commissioned as an SLT. The obit refers to his cousin Dr Jim Noonan of Moncton. Jim was also a UNTD (QUEEN CHARLOTTE '53 U-56623). The St Dunstan's Univ. Red and White Yearbook for 1957, features both cousins on p28 (see attached). Therein their Naval bona fides are mentioned. It is interesting that their stated aspirations back then seem to have been fulfilled in both cases. From an archival point of view, we do not often get a chance to note the birth-weight of UNTD's, but in Richard Noonan's case we can. St Dunstan's Univ. had a vibrant UNTD tender between 1948 and 1963. The NRD HMCS QUEEN CHARLOTTE was paid-off in the fall of 1964 and was Recommissioned in the fall of 1994. St Dunstan's itself was amalgamated with Prince of Wales College in 1969 to form UPEI.

JAMES STANISLAUS NOONAN — SCIENCE

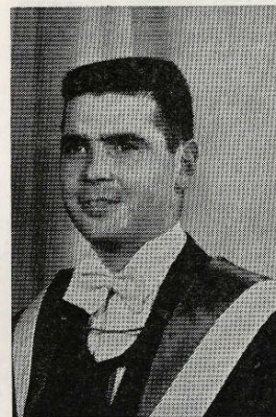

Summerside's only bright spot in an otherwise wet and dreary day on August 30, 1935, was the arrival of 8 pounds 7 ounces of mischief to Mr. and Mrs. Preston Noonan. Dick, after surveying the world situation for six years, entered St. Mary's Convent in 1941. After completing his studies there, he finished his high school education at the Summerside High School. Dick came to St. Dunstan's in the fall of '53 as a Freshman and has since proven himself an outstanding student and a keen participant in all campus activities. He was a member of our hockey team for two years, and was a zealous performer in all intramural sports. He served on the staff of **Red and White** for two years having the distinction of being one of the youngest students ever to grace a **Red and white** staff. Dick also served on the executives of the A.A.A. and the Students' Union; and he has shown himself to be a talented artist on the stage. Through his service in the U.N.T.D. for the past two summers, Dick has qualified for a commission in the Reserve Force.

Dick's good natured disposition, gentlemanly qualities, and Christian outlook have practically ensured him of future success. Next year Dick hopes to return to St. Dunstan's where he intends to further his education in the field of Commerce.
