A number of other plans are in the works. How about an evening dinner and cruise on beautiful Toronto Harbour this summer? And a mess dinner this November - of course.

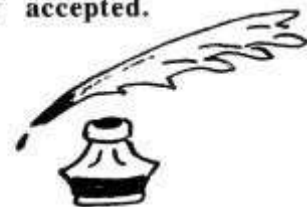

## GUELPH REUNION

The first UNTD in Canada started by Professor Jack Baker at the University of Guelph will hold a Reunion Weepers and Mess Dinner on Friday June 17, 1994 at Creelman Hall, University of Guelph.

As a member of the Canadian Navy League, Professor Baker, in conjunction with **HMCS Star**, began a pilot naval officer training programme in September 1942. As a result of this effort the UNTD became an official training programme on June 19, 1943 and Professor Baker was promoted to the rank of commander and appointed the first Staff Officer UNTD.

The reunion is being organized by Lt. Gordon Wright, RCNVR (Ret'd) and Lt. John Dugan UNTD (OVC) 1949-53 (Ret'd). Lt. Wright was one of the first UNTD training officers and is Jack Baker's son-in-law. His wife, Ruth and her sister "Twink" Maclean were honoured participants of the Baker family at the 50th Anniversary Reunion in Halifax.

Among the honoured guests in Guelph will be Vice Admiral Peter Cairns, Commander, Maritime Command and two of Guelph's UNTD (OAC/OVC) former commanding officers: John Carpenter 1947-58 and Dick Ellis 1958-64.

The cost for the dinner is \$30.00 and out of town guests can make hotel reservations at The College Inn (\$75.00), file #16550, phone # 1-800 563-9240. Dress has been promulgated as Blazer and Flannels or Business Suit, preferably with UNTD Tie or other Service Tie. There will be a group picture taken for nostalgic reasons and UNTD memorabilia such as ties, crests, lapel pins and the 50th Anniversary Edition of "UNTiDy Tales" will be on sale. Entertainment and a little military atmosphere will be provided by the band of **HMCS Star**.

## SPRING REUNION

A Sequel to Halifax 93! Yes, Gil Hutton, that consummate organizer is at it again. Many ex-UNTD have expressed regrets that due to other summer commitments they were unable to attend the now memorable UNTD 50th Anniversary Reunion in Halifax. At that reunion, Andy Shaw of Ottawa, in a euphoric mood after "Up Spirits", said "Lets have a Mini-reunion next Spring in Kingston". The idea made a lot of sense. The setting is perfect - only two hours drive from Toronto, Ottawa or Montreal, combined with the atmosphere of Royal Military College and an open house at the new building of **HMCS Catarqui**. It is located on a breathtaking site between the mouth of the Catarqui River and Kingston Harbour. The wardroom terrace provides a great view for the conviviality of the Meet and Greet activities as well as the Mess Dinner. The C.O., Cdr. Ron Paquin, an active member of the UNTD Association, will be our host and will be proud to personally conduct a tour of his stunning new stone frigate. (A special treat no doubt for Queen's University Alumni.)

The Reunion activities for the weekend of April 23-24 will recreate the successful formula of the Halifax Reunion. At the Meet and Greet, trays of light refreshments will be provided. The Mess Dinner in the Catarqui Wardroom will follow a "Dine the Ladies" format. Seating will be arranged in three wings: Toronto, Ottawa, and Kingston/Montreal. Dress for the occasion is "Any Naval Uniform" that you can get into and a black tie, or Blazer and Flannels with a UNTD Tie or any Service Tie. The guest speaker will be ex-UNTD and T.V. Journalist, Peter Trueman. After dinner there will be music and singing.

On Sunday, church parade in the Royal Military College Chapel is one you won't want to dodge. The same nostalgic ecumenical church service that left nary a dry eye in King's College at Halifax will be conducted by the same dynamic ex-UNTD duo, Rev. Bill Thomas and Father Tom McEntee. (Father Tom will also conduct a brief service afterward for Roman Catholics.)

After church parade, everyone will retire

to the Senior Staff Mess for the traditional "UP SPIRITS" and Brunch. Pusser's Rum will be issued in a tot measure of one quarter gill from the rum tub. It is an experience that is guaranteed to leave you with a warm feeling while you soak up the atmosphere of your surroundings. The Senior Staff Mess of Royal Military College has been described in our times of modern austerity as comparable to the "decadent luxury of an Eighteenth Century Aristocrat"; the type of thing that caused Hellyer to see green. You will have brunch overlooking the outer harbour and the islands in the St. Lawrence River.

A private tour of the Marine Museum of the Great Lakes will wrap up the afternoon activities. With a former coast guard ship alongside, the museum is located in a refurbished brick warehouse on the waterfront. It contains a special collection of paintings and drawings by World War II RCNVR Artist, Grant Macdonald.

Accommodation can be arranged at special rates at Holiday Inn (\$75.00) and Howard Johnson's (\$65.00). Both overlook the harbour and are close to HMCS Catarqui and Royal Military College. For the more budget conscious, the Donald Gordon Conference Centre at Queen's University has plain, single or double rooms with private bathrooms for \$36.00.

During registration on Saturday and brunch on Sunday, memorabilia will be on sale: UNTD Ties and Lapel Pins, Blazer and Wall Crests. A UNTD Video can be ordered for \$10.00. The 50th Anniversary Edition of the history of the UNTD, entitled, "**UNTiDy Tales**" will also be available probably for the last time. This limited edition of anecdotal stories by UNTD Cadets from 1943 to 1968 is a bargain at \$15.00. (see LETTERS)

The program has a lot to offer especially for those who were unable to get to Halifax last summer. Don't miss this opportunity to renew acquaintances and reminisce about the days when you thought you had the world by the tail. As Reunion Guest of Honour, Vice Admiral Allan (UNTD '50) says, "When was it better than when you were a UNTD".

Whether it was dancing to the big band sound of HMCS YORK - STAR Concert Band, Highland dancing to the Pipes and Drums of the 48th Highlanders or jumping to the beat of the Electric Brigade of the United States Naval Academy, there was music to satisfy all of the nine hundred guests at the Toronto Garrison Officer's Ball hosted by HMCS YORK this year. Wine flowed with a beautifully served roast beef dinner at the three tables of ten made up by the UNTD Association in support of the Navy. Following dinner, the cavernous ballroom of the Sheraton Centre echoed to: Heart of Oak, Men of Harlech, John Peel, Braganza, The Buffs, Blue Bonnet and ceremonial marches of many other units as guests filed past the head table in the Parade of Marches.
